

## "GETTING PARSONAL"

Rev. William D. Ingraham

I was seated in a crowded pew in a small town UCC congregation down river from Detroit. It was in the early 1990s. I say "down river" because *south* of Detroit is Windsor, Ontario, Canada -- the only place in the 48 contiguous US that one looks south into Canada. To go south from Detroit, you first go west, following the Detroit River. Eventually you turn and work your way south. We were about an hour from where I lived and served. The occasion was the retirement of a colleague. I had known him for only a few short years but had come to love and admire him. I was even closer to his wife, with whom I served on a couple of denominational committees.

It was a cold, mid-winter's day, but even so, I was pulling at the collar of my black preaching robe (the same robe I wear here), wishing somebody would open one of the stained-glass windows. The service was long, but appropriately so. Hymns were sung and prayers were prayed, and a lifetime of service to this and other congregations was marked and celebrated. The service was followed by a church supper with all the trimmings, a combination of German, Polish and Italian food you could depend upon at any UCC church supper in Southeast Michigan.

What brought these memories, and more, to mind was my contemplating a line from the sermon that was preached that day. It was spoken by the Associate Conference Minister for our area, given as a charge to the congregation upon their beloved, long-term pastor's retirement. "This very day," he said, "you find yourselves standing on the edge of a future you do not yet fully know." Those words have bounced around in my head for nearly 30 years now. In fact, I've spoken myself occasionally in a sermon or in a pastoral prayer, even here, and once while preaching to a congregation upon the retirement of their own beloved, long-term pastor -- another colleague of mine, and a friend.

I don't remember anything else from the sermon that day. I remember processing in and out the sanctuary with my colleagues, singing hymns joyfully, and the sweat on my brow as we sat in the crowded pew. I remember the choir all in burgundy robes, giving their all in the anthems they sang. I remember the serving tables, downstairs in Fellowship Hall, heavy laden with roast pork with brown gravy, mostaccioli, stuffed cabbage leaves and more. I even recall standing in the cold, dark parking lot long afterward, talking with a friend after most everyone else had left.

The dawn of a new year is one of the times the line from that sermon always comes to mind. Last year has drawn to a close and is behind us. Next year has just begun and is all stretched out before us. We stand on the edge of a future we do not yet fully know. As we face the coming year, what are your personal hopes and dreams? No doubt health and well-being for ourselves and loved ones is high on our list. We long for the waning of the COVID-19 coronavirus global pandemic, for vaccinations to continue to hold up, and for life to continue to inch back towards normal. We pray for children and teachers to have a successful second half of their year, and for financial stability and a sense of accomplishment in our work. Some of us hope to travel, or to make progress on a special project, or to reach a specific goal. These are a few things that come to mind for me. What are your personal hopes and dreams for the coming year?

What about our church? What hopes do we hold for our congregation and for our community? I have high hopes that in-person attendance will continue its slow but steady increase over the months ahead, all the while maintaining a strong online worship presence. I'm hopeful we'll find a musician to accompany our services and lead our music ministry. I'm hopeful we'll raise money and complete the long-needed repairs to our bell tower, along with restoring the narthex, replacing the heating system and sprucing up the sanctuary. (More details on these projects coming in early 2022!) And I'm eager to resume programming for children and youth. These are just some of the things I look forward to in the coming year. What's on your list of hopes and dreams for our church?

The year 2021, like 2020 before it, was marked by grief and many challenges. Yet there were blessings, too. We have much to be thankful for! As 2022 dawns, with the boundless potential and possibility it portends, I pray God's blessing for us all -- that whatever may come our way, we will strive to live as people of faith and hope, clinging to God's goodness, mercy and love, boldly living as Christ's disciples, today and always.

#### Supplemental Holiday Food Distribution

Thanks to the generosity of our Church family and friends and several food drives by community groups, we raised enough food to provide an extra week's food distribution to 195 families. So in addition to the Neighbors in Need (NIN) Christmas distribution, we provided another week of supplemental food for the week between Christmas and New Year's when NIN is closed.

Outreach would like to thank the A and B teams of volunteers who regularly staffed the NIN Food Pantry throughout the past year as well as their families for allowing them the time to volunteer. These 35 volunteers faithfully came regardless of whether the weather was hot, cold, raining, or snowing. Many worked in the Parish Hall, but others braved the outside weather each week to greet our guests. We also want to thank everyone who donated food and money to the Food Pantry. Through your commitment we have been able to better serve our guests.

#### Gifts to the Manger

Cindy Bateson decorated the large box in the church crossroads in which you put your Gifts to the Manger this year. Lori Bennett picked up 3 big bags of toys and 1 big bag of wrapping paper on December 15<sup>th</sup> and delivered them to the Methuen Arlington Neighborhood (MAN) Inc. for children who participate in their programs. Also included was a bag for a specific 10 year old boy with a hat and mittens from the Mitten Tree.

There were two older boys waiting for Lori. She opened the back of her van and they took everything out and brought it inside for her. She did not go in, but waived to all the kids. Within an hour Ruthie Estes called thanking her for the gifts and excited for the wrapping paper. Ruthie said the parents loved being able to wrap gifts for their children.

#### The Mitten Tree

The Mitten Tree located in the church crossroads outside the Church Office has been beautifully decorated with warm mittens, hats and scarves. We thank everyone who donated items to the Mitten Tree, especially Chapel parents and the church's Prayer Shawl Group. These items will be donated to children served by the Methuen Public Schools' Family Resource Center at 10 Ditson Place, Methuen. The Mitten Tree is a joint ministry between the Outreach Team and the Chapel School.

#### 2022 Souper Bowl of Caring

The Outreach Team is planning our 2022 Souper Bowl Challenge. Although we were not physically in church last year, the competition between Team Right and Team Left was outstanding! First Church, together with the Chapel School and the community, collected 1265 cans of soup and raised \$1,780 in donations for Neighbors in Need.

We will kick off our **2022 Souper Bowl of Caring** on Sunday, January 16th. In the next four weeks members of the Left and Right Church Teams will be joined by Chapel School parents and teachers in bringing soup cans to the church on Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 12:30 PM and Sundays before and after the church service (10:00 – 11:00 AM). On Sunday, February 13<sup>th</sup>, we will find out if Team Left or Team Right won the coveted Souper Bowl of Caring trophy in 2022. The real winner will be Neighbors in Need to whom we are donating all the soup.
