Minister's Message ***Rev. Dr. Ann Rogers-Brigham***

Dear members and friends of First Church,

As June arrives, we are fully into the Pentecost season of the church year. Some of us may be thinking about a summer break, a family gathering or, maybe, marking a celebration in life like a graduation, a birthday or an anniversary. We are glad for those occasions and for the warmer weather that gives us the chance to focus on rest and renewal.

So, what about life in the church? Do we slow down and get into vacation mode? We may have a change of pace since we are not gearing up for big Christmas or Easter services, but we have great openings for new discoveries about life in the Spirit.

If there is any time to celebrate the vibrancy of life in the Spirit, I think it has to be this month! Yes, that word "vibrancy" is intentional. The story of Pentecost in Acts pictures the Spirit animating the early church community to continue the vocation of Jesus in increasingly wider fields of ministry. The overarching call is to recognize how the Spirit is present and active today.

For me, it means reading, thinking, praying, planning and being inspired for the spiritual journey. This is not only on a personal level but on a church leadership level. Pentecost asks us to broaden our view and imagine our church life as full of possibilities. Can you imagine what that means with me?

I want to share a few quotes that may help us think of how we can imagine change, growth, possibilities with the Spirit leading us toward a Spirit-filled life at First Church:

A quote from the Eastern Orthodox tradition, Demetra Velisarios Jaquet, with Women's Orthodox Ministries: *"We have a crisis of connectedness in our time, with each other and with God. Generosity has not been humanity's defining attribute, and trusting has not been humanity's strength. The Spirit of trust and mutual giving is a gift from God, perhaps obscured but not obliterated. The indwelling of the Holy Spirit has a profound effect on every person, for by this action is begun the transformation from doubt to faith, from selfishness and fear to selflessness and trust."*

A quote from the book, Credo, by Rev. William Sloane Coffin (p. 130): *"If indeed we love the Lord with all our hearts, minds, and strength, we are going to have to stretch our hearts, open our minds, and strengthen our souls, whether our years are three score and ten or not yet twenty. God cannot lodge in a narrow mind. God cannot lodge in a small heart. To accommodate God, they must be palatial."*

A quote from Women-Church: Theology and Practice (1986) by Rosemary Radford Ruether: *"The occasion of Pentecost, in which Judaism celebrates its founding in the giving of the law, and Christianity its foundation in the dispensation of the prophetic Spirit of the messianic age, is an appropriate time to focus on the meaning of salvific community—both the disciplines by which we need to walk and the prophetic Spirit that must inspire us."*

This quote comes from the book, The God We Never Knew, by Marcus Borg: *"The spiritual journey, in Christianity as well as non-Christian forms, is about the hatching of the heart, the opening of the self to the reality of the Spirit. This opening begins the process by which the self at its deepest level is reoriented and transformed."*

A quote from Henri Nouwen's book, The Life of the Beloved (1992): *"Living the spiritual life means living life as one unified reality. The forces of darkness are the forces that split, divide, and set in opposition. The forces of light unite. Literally, the word "diabolical" means dividing. The demon divides; the Spirit unites."*

All of these quotes by spiritual writers along with all our gospel writers remind us that the Spirit was a force behind Jesus' ministry and is to be behind ours as well. Jesus modeled a Spirit-filled life and we ask how we can do this at First Church in this interim time. I hope, as we have opportunity in our summer book study, conversation may lead us to talk about how we shape "life in the Spirit" in the local church. Or we can make time for one-on-one sharing as we envision the vitality of First Church life guided by the Spirit and anchored in God's abiding love in practical ways. There's so much to talk about this Pentecost season!

Whatever is unfolding in your life this month, I hope you'll take time to ponder how the Spirit is persistently seeking to lure you into deeper recognition of the divine presence of God in your life. May the Holy Spirit bless us, giving us a holy life together at First Church.

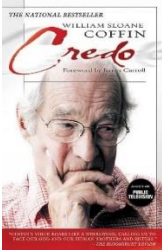
Summer Office Hours

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SUMMER BOOK STUDY



Beginning June 21st, and going through July 19th (5 Sundays), we will meet after worship/coffee hour for about an hour for discussion of the book, Credo, by William Sloane Coffin. You can come to any of the sessions; each Sunday we'll be reading some of the passages and inviting discussion. (It is not necessary to purchase the book as readings will be distributed for each week, but it is a great book and you may want to own one) If you read ahead and find favorite passages, we'll invite you to share them as we move through the sections.

This book (c. 2004) is a collection of sayings and passages from Rev. William Sloane Coffin's sermons. He was the chaplain at Yale University during the Viet Nam era, and the pastor at New York's famous Riverside Church for twenty years. He was the most famous "progressive" pastor in America for a long time.

Let me share a portion of what James Carroll wrote in the Forward of the book (p. 13):
"This book is a feast of rare expression; a display of subtlety and insight that shows why Bill Coffin matters so much to America and the world. The economy of verbal construction, the wit, the grasp of the core, the biblical ground, the high literateness, the knack for simplicity, the infallible feel for the memorable word, and the sly that God exists and that God's existence matters—make Bill Coffin the greatest public preacher of this time."



From the Chair of the Church Board...

Greetings from your newly elected Board Chair. Thank you for bestowing upon me the privilege of leading our church for the next four years. It is truly an honor to be part of this community.

It was great to see everyone at our 297th Annual Meeting and hear about all the wonderful things happening in the life of First Church. If you were not able to join us, there are still copies of our Annual Report available. I encourage you to read about all the amazing things happening at First Church and how you can get involved.

Over the next few months, I look forward to meeting with you to hear your ideas as to how we may better live our mission – ***Seeking God, Caring for Each Other, and Improving Our Community.*** Over the summer, the Church Board and our committees will be busy planning for our upcoming year. These next few months will be a great time for reflection.

As always, there is a lot going on in the life of our church:

- Our search for our next settled pastor is continuing. We have received 12 pastor profiles and have invited 8 candidates to interview with us. We have two active candidates, and we have invited both to meet with us in person. We welcome your prayers as we search for our next settled pastor. If you have any questions about the search process or would like to share any information with the committee, please speak to me or any of the other members of the search committee.
- Our Outreach Committee is also hard at work. Last week, we welcomed Thomas Donovan, a Licensed Mental Health Counselor and retired police officer, to be our guest in worship to speak about his personal journey to sobriety and the services available to those experiencing a mental health crisis in our community. Next month we will begin working on our Back-to-School program to help children in the Methuen Arlington Neighborhood get the clothes and supplies they need for school. Please speak to Lisa Ferry if you'd like to help. Between these projects, our food pantry, and so much more, there are many ways that you can make an impact on our community.
- We will be honoring our children, teachers and volunteers on June 7th with a special service for Children's Sunday. Our youth will be participating in the service, and we will recognize our teachers and volunteers for their service this past year. Please bring your extended family to celebrate our youth and join us for what is sure to be a memorable service.
- The Chapel School is wrapping up its 68th year of service to the community! Enrollment is in process for next year, so if you know of a family with children looking for an amazing (and affordable) preschool experience, I invite you to connect them with Gina or Roberta. Tours are happening regularly.
- As you may have heard, Mike recently applied for a grant to the Sisler Foundation to support the restoration of our 1886 James E. Treat (Opus 2) pipe organ. Over time, wear and aging have begun to take their toll, and full restoration will be needed to preserve both its sound and its legacy, as we prepare for our 300th anniversary. If you feel moved to support this effort, please consider a contribution to the Organ Restoration Fund. Every gift, regardless of amount, helps to sustain the music and ministry of our church.

- Speaking of our 300th anniversary, it is right around the corner. If you're interested in helping us plan our celebration, please speak to Becky Smith or Rich Rolon about how you can get involved.

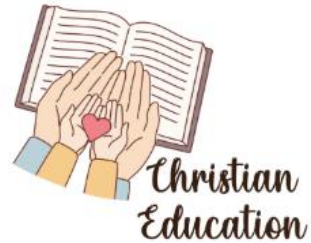


Christian Education

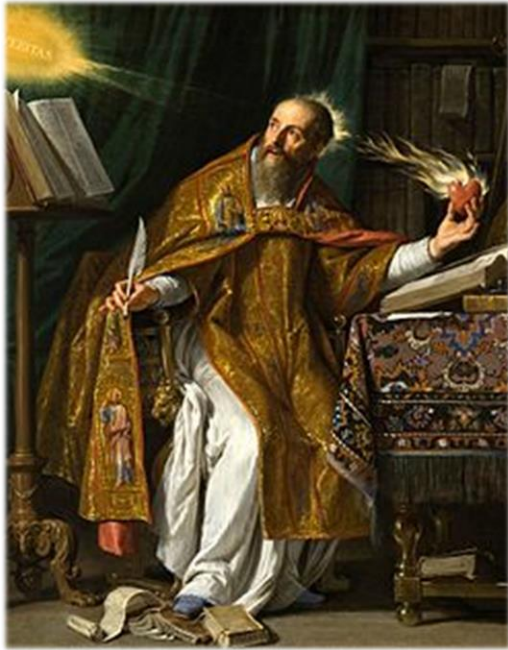

Mental Health Awareness Sunday

During the May 17th church service, Mr. Tom Donovan participated in our church service as a guest speaker. He discussed his role as director of the PATH program here in Methuen, including the counseling services and resources he provides to the community. He connected well with our children during the Children's Message, speaking at their level about handling their feelings and reaching out to others for help. During the adult portion of the service, he shared his personal story and his own journey with addiction and mental health. It was a meaningful and helpful discussion, and we are grateful for his visit. We encourage you to reach out to Tom if needed, and to share his information with family and friends.



Back to School Project

Lisa Yarid-Ferry and her team are in the planning stages for the annual MAN Back to School Project. Sizing dates are scheduled in July, followed by shopping by the team. In the past the Back to School Project has provided 75 children who attend the Methuen Arlington Neighborhood Center backpacks filled with school supplies. They also receive a new outfit including jeans, a shirt, a hoodie, a pair of New Balance sneakers, and a hat knit by our Prayer Shawl Ministry Team. They can pick up a snack bag to go provided by the Masons, and our mayor sponsors a visit from an ice cream truck. Our Mall Day, when the children can pick up their new belongings, is scheduled on August 15th at Methuen Arlington Neighborhood Center on Tenney Street. Volunteers are welcome! More details will follow.

Fall Book It! Book Drive

The Outreach Team is in the planning stages for the annual fall School Book Drive. Having donated books to the 4 grammar schools in Methuen, we have chosen the Methuen Public Schools Early Childhood Center as our next recipient. Members of the Outreach Team have met with Kelly Blanchette, Director of ECC, to discuss the type of books needed for the preschool population, including children with a variety of special needs. Reading to preschoolers not only helps develop pre-literacy skills, but also supports growth in listening, speaking, and even motor skills. Spotlight on Bread & Roses

This month Outreach would like to highlight our **Bread & Roses Team** and the important work they do for the wider community. For almost 20 years, the Bread & Roses Team at our church has prepared and delivered a monthly meal to the Bread & Roses Center in Lawrence. Our chicken pot pie meal prepared by our volunteers is one of the favorite meals. Bread & Roses was founded in 1980 as a soup kitchen and has been a center of hope and caring to thousands of people in the Merrimack Valley. Over 180 people a night receive a nutritious three-course meal served restaurant-style by volunteers. Guests benefit from a friendly community where people know each other by name. Guests also have the option of taking their meal to go. Bread & Roses has expanded their services to include an Emergency Food Pantry, Community Food Outreach, Food Rescue and Life & Health Services. Check out their website at www.breadandroseskitchen.org.

Currently our Bread & Roses Meal Team is headed up by Allan and Bobbi Barlow. They shop for meal ingredients and lead the team in the kitchen. Preparation includes cooking and cutting up a large amount of chicken, peeling, chopping and cooking carrots, and mixing the ingredients together in 7 large foil pans, including added frozen peas and large cans of cream of chicken soup. The chicken pot pies are then covered and refrigerated until they are delivered the following day by Allan and Bobbi.



Special thanks to Allan and Bobbi for their leadership, and current and recent volunteers, including Pat King, Kathy Romano, Sheila Dube, Terry and Pat Romano, Carole and John Silva, and Barbara Donaghue. Many others have worked on this outreach ministry over the years, and we are thankful for your past support.

Open and Affirming (O&A) Committee

The following article is from the United Methodist Church web site. Please consider how we as a congregation can continue to discover how to live as a church that welcomes and embraces everyone who comes through our doors.

Three Things to Look for in a Welcoming Church

“We are a very welcoming church.”

No church in their right mind would ever say anything otherwise. But quite often, our actions betray our words. Too many times, churches who say they’re welcoming *are* welcoming — but only to one another — the people they know.

I remember sitting with a group of ushers, who were lamenting that they had to go through “training” because they’ve been ushers for such a long time. I showed them a picture from a previous Sunday where the ushers were standing in a circle and not noticing a family (that nobody recognized) walking by them. I asked them what they saw in the picture and, unsurprisingly, no one wanted to talk anymore.

What happens is that when we’ve been part of a church for a long time, we completely take everything for granted. We just assume everyone knows where to go because *I* know where to go. Which is wild because *nobody* would act like that when we have first-time guests at our homes. We tell them where the bathrooms are, where they can find towels, where we keep our linens, etc.

Here are some things you can look for to see if a church is really welcoming as well as how to help your faith community make sure it’s making meaningful connections.

There are three things I would like to highlight as we talk about welcoming and hospitality in churches.

Is your website welcoming?

The first impression your church makes on a guest isn’t when they first pull up to your parking lot. It’s the website. And far too many churches *still* ignore the importance of a website. There are *way* too many church websites that still look like they’re preparing for Y2K. We all know first impressions matter (for better or worse). Know that the first impression one gets from your church is the website.

The after-welcome welcome

The second area I see many churches falling short in is what happens after the benediction (or right after service ends). Most churches are great in welcoming guests before church starts. But after we are dismissed, we try to get out of the church property to beat the Baptists to lunch. I was once told that one of the loneliest moments in visiting a church is after the benediction because everyone knows where to go and they’re all in a hurry to get there so people who don’t know are left to discover on their own where the children’s pick up may be or where the bathrooms are or if there’s a coffee and donuts. Ensure that your church is as intentional and diligent in their welcoming *after* service as they are before service.

The 5-10-Link

The final thing I'll share in this article is the 5-10-link rule. I do not know who came up with it, but it is something that *everyone* in church can practice (not just those who are on the welcoming team/ministry).

5 minutes before and after service, make sure you meet someone you never met. Avoid leading with the question, "Is this your first time?" Because it may not be. They may have been there for years, but your paths never crossed. Simply offer a, "I don't think we've met yet" or the simple, "Hi, my name so and so, what's yours?"

The 10 refers to distance. When someone you haven't met is within 10ft of you, go and greet them. Even if you're standing in an already established circle, have the courage to excuse yourself and break the circle to greet the person you haven't had the opportunity to meet yet. In fact, if you had to break the circle to greet them, invite them in the circle of fellowship you were already standing in — which leads to the last rule: Link.

"Link" refers to connecting them to other people in the church. In the process of getting to know them (their name, where they're from, what work they do) perhaps they have something in common with someone you already know. Maybe they just started teaching at a local elementary school and your friend works at that same school. Connect them to your friend.

We cannot have a passive mindset when we're working on making people feel welcome. We have to be active and intentional and diligent. We also have to take a risk, in the sense that we may have to step out of our comfort zone to really greet someone we may not know at church.

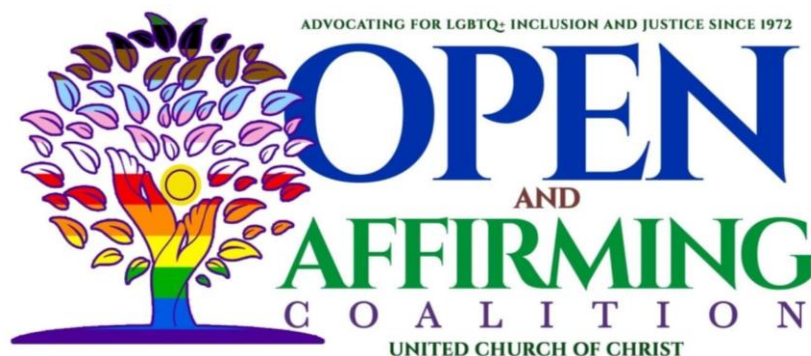
People come to church — not just to connect with God, but with God's people as well. Everyone is in need of a community. Each of us has the power and ability to help someone feel a sense of belonging in your community.

Don't be passive with that responsibility. Make the best of it and continue to connect people to your community and to God.

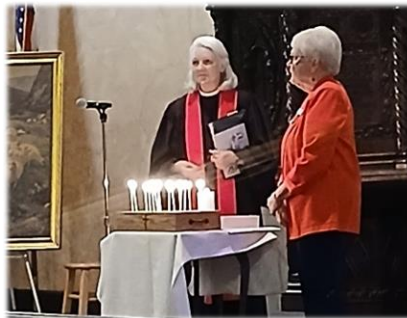
